



REDIRECT TO DONATE

Alabama taxpayers may REDIRECT up to 50% of their tax liability to Scholarships for Kids.

RESERVE

STEP

1

Go to myalabamataxes.alabama.gov, sign in or set up your MAT (My Alabama Taxes) account, report a donation to an SGO and choose SCHOLARSHIPS FOR KIDS.

DONATE

STEP

2

After reporting your donation through MAT, you have 30 days to remit your payment to Scholarships for Kids (unless your reservation is made mid-December or later in which case you have until January 10 to remit payment).

RECEIVE

STEP

3

Once your donation is received by Scholarships for Kids, the donation will be verified with the state. A receipt will then be generated to your "Correspondence" folder in your MAT account. You will also be mailed a receipt from Scholarships for Kids for federal income tax purposes.

Under current Alabama law, a scholarship granting organization cannot award, restrict, or reserve scholarships on the basis of a donor's restriction or condition. Similarly, a taxpayer may not claim a tax credit for a contribution that is restricted or conditioned by the donor, including a restriction or condition requiring that the donor's contribution be directed to a particular student or to a particular school.

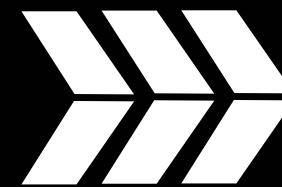

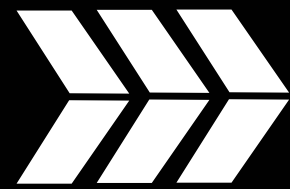

SCHOOL HIGHLIGHT: NORTHSIDE METHODIST ACADEMY



Northside Methodist Academy's Scholarships for Kids story began in the summer of 2014. God had made it clear that I was to lead the school - so my consistent question to Him was, "What is it that you uniquely want us to do here?"

As God often does, the answer to my questions had already been provided through our own life experience. My wife Linda, and I had sacrificed greatly to put our own three sons through private Christian school - a school for which we are very appreciative and grateful. But like most private school environments in the south, the families involved were exclusively white and upper middle class and above and the students were all above average in academic abilities. So, the answer came - could Northside be a place that reflected the diversity that God desired in His body? Could we be a place where privileged and underprivileged could learn together, where white, black, brown and yellow could learn to love each other as brothers and sisters in Christ, where students bound for college, for technical school or for the military could walk together even as they head down very different paths?

Scholarships for Kids has allowed us to pursue this vision. As a school, we have not only benefited from now having the resources to open our doors to families of different financial backgrounds, but we also have benefited from being seen in our community as a place where boundaries are being crossed and where diversity is being embraced as a positive in the midst of a very divisive overall culture. Our student population has more than doubled since we began our journey with Scholarships for Kids. This program has allowed Northside Methodist Academy to reach into lives previously out of reach. It's allowed us to impact lives in a manner which we previously lacked the resources to accomplish.

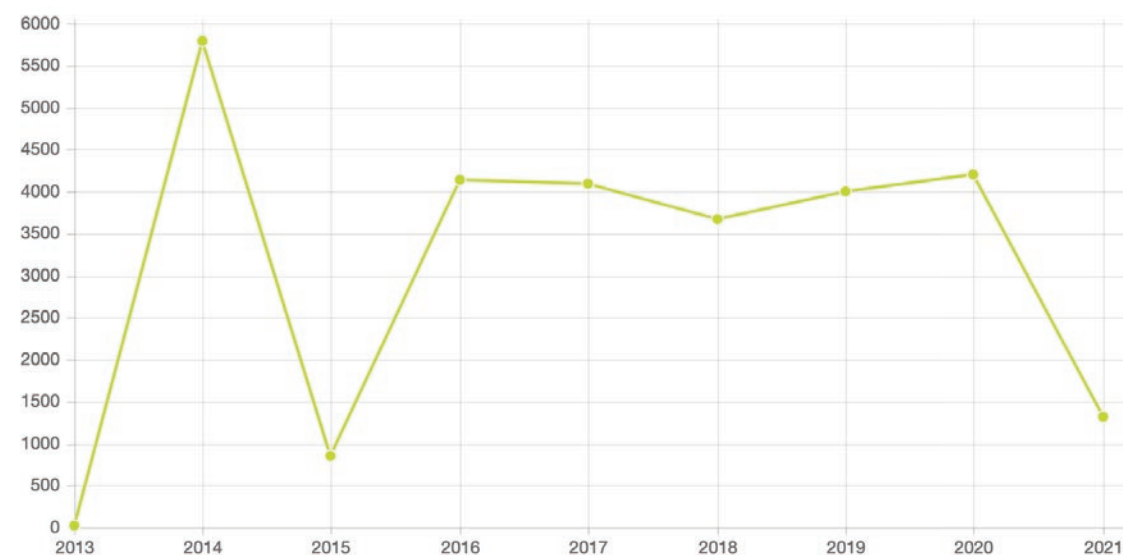

MIT is undoubtedly the best thing that has happened to me. As a low-income, first-gen student, attending a top-tier university was something so distant and impossible to me. I felt like it was a dream that could not be attained. Now, living the dream, I feel so inspired by my surroundings and classes. My peers are from across the world. There is a club for anything you could think of and every type of sport. I spent the first quarter sailing for P.E. which is something I would have never expected. Although I am not the smartest or hardest worker at the school, I have the drive and motivation to succeed. The course load is extremely difficult, and I have spent many sleepless nights working on problem sets but adjusting my schedule accordingly and getting accustomed to the difficulty of my classes is something that I know I will get used to.

I started attending a private school in middle school for 6th grade. I went from a class of 30 5th graders to a 6th grade class of approximately 12 kids. The class size went down, and I felt a personable relationship with my teachers. I remember wearing uniforms, attending religious services, going to religion class, and saying grace before meals; these were all things that are separated from public school. I think that the smaller class environment helped my learning, and I certainly appreciated that those who were Christian/Catholic were free to openly practice and share their religion at school.

My favorite thing about my high school is how tight knit the community was. The faculty knew most if not every student. I loved my teachers and how much they taught me. Sports games, community events, and other activities felt like a family outing. I remember freshman year going to see the girls' volleyball team in Birmingham play and the crowd was wild, celebrating our girls. In another instance, the arts and foreign languages went on a trip to the Frist Art Museum, and we had the time of our lives appreciating the art and enjoying our time at a nearby mall. The fond memories with my running team (who are extremely dear to me and I am forever grateful for and proud of) are lasting memories that will stay with me for life. Looking back at times like this, I just get a burst of joy remembering the people that were and are so dear to me.
